Minutes of the 40<sup>th</sup> Meeting of the Steering Committee on Watershed Development Component of Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana (WDC-PMKSY) held on 26<sup>th</sup> June, 2019 at 11:30 AM at Nirman Bhawan, New Delhi

The 40<sup>th</sup> meeting of Steering Committee on Watershed Development Component of Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sinchayee Yojana (WDC-PMKSY) was held on June 26, 2019 at 11:30 AM under the Chairpersonship of Secretary, Department of Land Resources (DoLR). The list of participants is at **Annexure II**.

At the outset Joint Secretary (WM) welcomed the participants. Secretary, DoLR then in his opening remarks mentioned that Watershed Development has been an on-going programme but its visibility is poor. He suggested that Programme Division should focus on improving its visibility by undertaking documentation, short films on best practices and success stories of works done in the field. Secretary also mentioned that ongoing projects should be completed on mission mode. He pointed out that there are shortcomings in implementation on the part of Centre and States as well, like funds are not being released on time and State Level Sanctioning Committee (SLSC) meetings for approval of Annual Action Plans are not being held on time. Department has received some End-line evaluation reports and outcomes are very encouraging. Secretary stressed upon expediting the submission of pending End-line evaluation reports and mentioned that about 62 mha area of degraded land is still to be treated for which Programme Division should take initiative on priority.

Joint Secretary (WM) urged that States should put in their best efforts to make scheme a grand success. States should prepare their Annual Action Plan in advance and get the approval of SLSC before beginning of the financial year so that they should be in position to submit the proposal to DoLR well in time.

Joint Secretary (WM) gave an overview of the WDC-PMKSY programme:

- (i) 8214 watershed development projects were sanctioned during 2009-10 to 2014-15 in 28 States involving an area of about 39.07 million. Rs 33,642.24 crore was the Central share; out of total project cost of Rs.50,739.58 crore. There were no new watershed projects sanctioned after 2014-15.
- (ii) Of the 8214 projects, 2364 projects have been completed in 18 States and 1832 projects had been transferred to the States, of which 1487 projects were in preparatory phase and 345 projects were uninitiated. Thus 4018 projects are under

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implementation. Out of these, 399 projects are in Consolidation Phase and 3619 projects are in Works phase. Although End-line evaluation is part of the Closure Protocol, but such evaluations have not been submitted by the States even after one year of the submission of administrative completion of the projects. End-line evaluations have been received in respect of 416 completed projects only from five States (Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Karnataka, Odisha and Tripura).

- (iii) DDG (PME) mentioned that States have to submit End-line evaluation report of the completed projects, as it will help during the formulation of fresh proposal.
- (iv) 5,87,080 water harvesting structures have been created, 12,84,680 ha of area was brought under protective irrigation and about 25,92,988 farmers have benefited during last five years. Joint Secretary (WM) mentioned that physical achievements are noticeable and have persistent impact on the ecology of the area.
- (v) Rs. 17,464.12 crore has been released till 31.03.2019 as Central share. BE for 2019-20 is Rs 1961.00 crore.

	(iii) With reference to adoption of Guidelines for Watershed Development Funds (WDFs), representative of West Bengal informed that they have prepared their own Guidelines for WDF fund and same is under process for approval of Competent Authority. He informed that the WDF Guidelines prepared are more or less in the same line to that of Karnataka's. DDG (PME) suggested that once WDF Guidelines have been approved, SLNA West Bengal may share the same with DoLR.	mater.

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- (iv) NRSC informed that Monitoring of IWMP Watersheds (presently WDC-PMKSY) using Geospatial Technologies has approval upto March 2020 and expressed their willingness for continued monitoring in future and requested for extension of MoU.
  - AS&FA (MoRD) advised that geo-tagging are available at lowest level under MGNREGS. Manpower resources of MGNREGS may be utilized for geo-tagging of activities of watershed projects and some amount of honorarium may be provided to them.
- (v) On the issue of Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) for South and East Region, the representatives of NIRD&PR / MANAGE opined that considering the time constraints of WDC-PMKSY upto March 2020, it may not be possible to monitor and evaluate each and every watershed project. However, they can evaluate them on sample basis.
  - DDG (PME) pointed out that NITI Aayog is also conducting impact assessment of completed projects and most probably reports will be submitted by them in the month of September, 2019.
  - Secretary enquired about feasibility of monitoring of projects on regular basis.
- (vi) Joint Secretary (WM) urged States to reconcile the physical and financial data reported on MIS and that of hard copy being sent to DoLR for compilation.
- (vii) Joint Secretary (WM) also expressed that there are some updation issues on PFMS. However, Watershed Division is reviewing the implementation of PFMS

upto last beneficiary level.

- AS&FA (MoRD) said the report on PFMS is very encouraging and he desired to organize a separate workshop on PFMS either in Delhi or other place to achieve 100% PFMS results. He suggested that DoLR may organize a workshop on PFMS for this scheme separately. He observed that only few States like Chhattisgarh, Kerala and Manipur are using PFMS upto village level and wanted to know how they are using at village level.
- DC (WD) informed that about 80% of the expenditure under the scheme is being carried out though Watershed Committee located at village level.
- AS&FA (MoRD) also pointed out that some States like Gujarat, Maharashtra, Odisha, Rajasthan, Karnataka and Uttar Pradesh have more than Rs.100 crore as unspent balance. States should utilize this amount immediately.
- (viii) Joint Secretary (WM) informed that SLSC meeting in the States are generally delayed. Because of this, States could not submit their proposal well in time and funds released to them get delayed.

Secretary, DoLR directed the Programme Division to organize workshop for PFMS on priority.

States were advised to hold SLSC meeting well in advance (say in the last quarter of the financial year) so that funds could be released by April / May.
